We are officially one third of the way through the 2024 Legislative Session. The first three weeks are always very fast paced and this one is moving very quickly.

We are officially at the point of the Legislative Session where the pressure starts to build as impending deadlines for House subcommittees to wrap up their hearings soon and the release of the proposed House and Senate budgets are increasing the stress levels in the halls of the Capitol.

MIAF has been working every day on all things boating related in Tallahassee. We are tracking over 100 bills this Legislative Session and numerous appropriations related to boating, boating infrastructure, boating safety and clean marina to name a few.

We are gearing up for MIA Days in Tallahassee on February 6th and 7th. We are excited about our line up of speakers on the February 6th and of course the networking during the reception and dinner to follow. If you are attending and intend to try and make appointments with your own legislator, I would strongly suggest you do so as soon as possible. The Legislators have limited time in between committees and being on the floor and numerous requests so the sooner the better your chances to get an appointment.

Below you will find updates to a few of the bills we are working on this Legislative Session. We have also included some budget line items of interest in the House and Senate budgets for your review. This is just the start of the budget process so stay tuned as both sides have to agree to a final balanced budget as required by the Constitution.on:

Boating Safety

Senate Bill 30-Boating Safety by Senator Garcia

As of the writing of this report, CS/SB 30 relating to Boating Safety still does not have a linked House companion bill. This bill received three committees of reference in the Senate, Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee, Senate Transportation, and Senate Fiscal Policy.

The bill passed the first committee of reference with a delete everything amendment unanimously December 6th. CS/SB 30 was then placed on the agenda of the second committee of reference, Senate Transportation on January 10th. The bill was temporarily passed. As we enter the fourth week of the Legislative Session, the bill is not on the Senate Transportation agenda.

This is a comprehensive bill relating to boating safety. The bill would delete the age exemption for individuals born before January 1, 1988, to have to take a boater safety course if driving a boat with 10 horsepower or more.

The bill also included language requiring the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles to issue an identification card or driver's license with a lifetime boater safety symbol if there is proof the individual received a boater safety identification card.

The bill also requires insurance for an individual convicted of BUI. The bill has other provisions for mandatory boating insurance and limits.

The bill includes language adding boating under the influence and human trafficking to the boater safety course.

This is a comprehensive boating bill. We will keep you posted on the progression of this bill and any potential amendments to other boating vehicles. The bill is still temporarily postponed in the Sente Transportation Committee.

Lost and Abandoned Property

House Bill 487-Lost and Abandoned Property by Representative Chaney

Senate Bill 682-Lost and Abandoned Property by Senator Martin

House Bill 487 has been moving through the process quickly. The bill only had two committees of reference. The bill was referred to the House Criminal Justice Committee and to the House Judiciary Committee. The bill has passed both committees unanimously. The bill passed the House Criminal Justice Subcommittee 15-0. The bill passed the second committee of reference as a committee substitute 19-0. **CS/HB 487 passed on the House floor 115-0 and was sent to the Florida Senate. The Senate has referred the bill to Senate Rules Committee.**

The bill deals with derelict vessels and has been supported by the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The goal of the legislation is to eliminate the number of trips law enforcement must make to meet statutory requirement to remove a derelict vessel.

The Senate Bill is comparable. The Senate Bill has received three committees of reference, Senate Environment and Natural Resources, Senate Criminal Justice, and Senate Rules. The bill was on the Sente Environment and Natural Resources Committee agenda January 10th. The bill passed 7-0. The bill is now up in its second committee of reference, Senate Criminal Justice Committee. The bill is scheduled to be heard January 30th.

Remember the bills must be identical to pass and currently they are not identical as of the writing of this report.

Anchoring

House Bill 437-Anchoring Limitation Areas by Representative Porras

Senate Bill 192-Anchoring Vessels in Anchoring Limitation Areas by Senator Garcia

Every year it seems Marine Industries deals with proposed bills limiting or banning anchoring on sovereign submerged state lands. Unfortunately, this year is not any different.

Committee Substitute for House Bill 437 has two committees of reference. The bill was referred to the House Agriculture, Conservation and Resiliency Subcommittee and the House Infrastructure Strategies Committee. The bill was heard in the first committee of reference on December 12th and passed with an amendment. The bill is now a committee substitute that will limit anchoring in sections in Biscayne Bay in Miami -Dade County. The bill states that a vessel may not anchor within 200 yards from the shore of the City of Miami Beach between State Road A1A and State Road 112. The law remains the same with the timeframe for the limitation area between one half hour after sunset and one half hour before sunrise. This bill is scheduled to be heard in the second committee of reference on January 16th at 1:00 pm.

The bill passed the committee with an amendment that added "nautical" mile and requires a tracking device "permanently affixed to the vessel". The bill passed 19-1 and is now CS/CS/HB 437. The bill is now ready to be heard on the House floor.

Senate Bill 192 has three committees of reference. The bill is referred to Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee, Senate Community Affairs, and the Senate Rules Committee. The bill was heard in its first committee of reference and passed favorably as a Committee Substitute 7-0. The bill had an amendment offered to mirror the House Bill. The bills are now identical. The next committee stop for the bill is the Senate Community Affairs Committee.

Vessel Safety

Senate Bill 822-Vessel Safety by Senator Rodriguez

As of the writing of this report, this bill still does not have a linked House companion. The bill has three committee references, Senate Criminal Justice, Senate Appropriations Committee on Criminal Justice and Civil Justice and Senate Fiscal Policy. As of the writing of this report, the bill is not scheduled to be heard in its first committee of reference.

The bill amends the current statute regarding penalties relating to collisions, accidents, and casualties. The bill amends penalties for damages only, injury other than serious bodily injury, serious bodily injury, and death of an individual under the influence. The bill goes on to amend the reckless and careless operation of a vessel. The bill provides an individual convicted of BUI manslaughter receive a minimum mandatory term of four years. The bill also includes penalties for killing an unborn child due to injuries to mother.

I highly recommend reading this bill to see the proposed changes for boating violations on the water.

Safe Storage of Firearm and Ammunition within Motor Vehicles and Vessels

Senate Bill 1250-Safe Storage of Firearm and Ammunition within Motor Vehicles and Vessels by Senator Berman

House 1087-Safe Storage of Firearm and Ammunition within Motor Vehicles and Vessels- by Representative Cassello

This bill requires a gun or ammunition be locked in a trunk, glove box, utility box or a locked container. This must be done when the vessel is not under the individual's control. This applies to unloaded weapons as well.

Senate Bill 1250 was referred to three committees of reference. The bill was referred to the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, Senate Judiciary Committee and Senate Rules Committee. As of the writing of this report the bill is not on the agenda of its first committee of reference.

House Bill 1087 is similar to Senate Bill 1250. House Bill 1087 was referred to three committees of reference Housse Criminal Justice, House Local Administration, Federal Affairs and Special Districts Subcommittee and House Judiciary Committee. The bill has not been scheduled to be heard in its first committee of reference as of the writing of this report.

Installation of Waterway Markers

Senate Bill 784-Installation of Waterway Markers by Senator Gruters

This bill still does not have a House companion. The Senate Bill is referred to three committees, Senate Environment and Natural Resources, Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government, and Senate Fiscal Policy. As of the writing of this report, the bill has not been scheduled to be heard in its first committee of reference.

The bill deals specifically with the installation of waterway markers. The proposed legislation requires all waterway markers permitted July 1, 2024, or after be attached to plastic breakaway structure or floating buoys. This language applies to state and local governments. The bill also prohibits waterway markers being attached to steel beams wood pilings. The bill allows for state and local governments to replace existing waterway markers prior to this language to be replaced by January 1, 2025.

Budget

The budgets are officially out in the House and the Senate. The goal is to be funded in at least one budget going into the amendatory process and ultimately the budget conference process. As you will see most FFWC budget items are funded and are identical. The budget process is fluid, and we will keep you posted as we watch the amendatory process and the debates on the respective floors.

1851 FIXED CAPITAL OUTLAY CORAL REEF RESTORATION FROM GENERAL REVENUE FUND 9,500,000

Funds in Specific Appropriation 1851 are provided to implement Florida's Coral Reef Restoration and Recovery (FCR3) Initiative to enter into agreements with academic and private partnerships to establish, expand, and maintain in-state propagation and grow-out facilities; develop and implement strategies and site-specific restoration plans including curriculum for a trained workforce; and reinforce and expand restoration efforts across Florida's Coral Reef.

1919A GRANTS AND AIDS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND NONSTATE ENTITIES - FIXED CAPITAL OUTLAY VERO BEACH CITY MARINA SOUTH COMPLEX FROM GENERAL REVENUE FUND 500,000

From the funds in Specific Appropriation 1919A, \$500,000 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund is provided for the Vero Beach City Marina South Complex (HF 3236).

1919B GRANTS AND AIDS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND NONSTATE ENTITIES - FIXED CAPITAL OUTLAY BRADENTON BEACH SEAGRASS PROTECTION & BOATING ACCESS FROM GENERAL REVENUE FUND 625,000

From the funds in Specific Appropriation 1919B, \$625,000 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund is provided for the Bradenton Beach Seagrass Protection & Boating Access (HF 2604).

1920 GRANTS AND AIDS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND NONSTATE ENTITIES - FIXED CAPI-TAL OUTLAY FLORIDA BOATING IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

SECTION 177. The unexpended balances of funds appropriated from the state's award from the federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (Public Law 117-2), in section 233 and section 234 of chapter 2023-239, Laws of Florida, remaining on June 30, 2024, shall revert and are appropriated for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 for the same purposes, except the following unexpended balances which shall revert immediately:

From the funds in Specific Appropriation 1991, \$10,000,000 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund is provided to the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission for the purpose of implementing a framework for the placement, monitoring, and maintenance of artificial habitat in Monroe County.

SECTION 205. The unexpended balances of funds appropriated from the state's award from the federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (Public Law 117-2), in section 233 and section 234 of chapter 2023-239, Laws of Florida, remaining on June 30, 2024, shall revert and are appropriated for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 for the same purposes, except for the Department of Transportation's unexpended balances, which shall be included in the department's Roll-Forward amendment as authorized in section 339.135(6)(c), Florida Statutes, and the following unexpended balances which shall revert immediate-ly:
