

2026 Legislative Session

Marine Industries Association of Florida Week 8

As we enter what should be the final week of the 2026 legislative session, it is hard to believe only eight weeks ago Marine Industries Association was walking the hallways and meeting with legislators discussing our priorities for the legislative session.

Obviously, the legislative session is going into extra innings again this year. Unfortunately, at this time, we cannot report whether we are looking at an extended session or special sessions or both. Either way we will continue to watch the Florida House of Representatives and Florida Senate continue to present and debate bills on the floor and watch for amendments.

As of the writing of this report, the House and Senate have not agreed on budget allocations to start the conference process. Please stay tuned as we will update you on any changes or agreements so we can begin to iron out the differences. Currently, everything is speculation and rumor.

As for boating issues, we did see Local Administration of Vessels by Senator Trumbull and Representative Andrade pass this week. It is one of only 55 bills that have passed so far this session.

Below are just a few of the bills we are highlighting for the 2026 Legislative Session!

Boater Safety

Boating safety continues to be a hot topic in Florida. Last year, the legislature passed major changes to boating safety laws.

This year there is a bill in the Senate and House adding to what was passed last session. These bills are very lengthy and need a concise and thorough review by the industry and law enforcement.

We have reached out to FWC and asked for their commentary on this bill.

Senate Bill 900 by Senator Garcia **was temporarily passed** in its first committee of reference in Senate Criminal Justice Committee on January 20th. The bill had one amendment filed by the sponsor and a late filed amendment by Senator Martin. The bill was not scheduled in Senate Criminal Justice during the second, third, fourth, fifth or sixth weeks of Session. The Senate Criminal Justice Committee is not scheduled to meet again as of the writing of this report.

Senate Bill 900 has three committees of reference. Senate Criminal Justice Committee, Senate Appropriations on Transportation and Economic Development and Senate Fiscal Policy.

House Bill 1447 was referred to four committees. The bill was referred to House Criminal Justice Subcommittee, House Governmental Operations,



House Budget Committee and House Judiciary Committee. The bill did not make the February 18th agenda and as of the writing of this report, there are not more meetings scheduled for the first committee of reference.

There have not been any changes to these bills during the eighth week.

Public Waters

The bills include everything from mooring boundaries to protecting beaches and bathing places. The bill concerning aspect of the bill would be the language specifying local government boundaries when applying for mooring field permits.

The Senate Bill is sponsored by Senator Rodriguez and has three committees of reference. The first committee is the Senate Health Policy Committee. The bill was not heard in the sixth week. **The Senate Health Policy Committee is not scheduled to meet again as of the writing of this report.** The bill is also referred to the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government. **We will continue to watch for amendments.**

House Bill 669 has four committees of reference. The bill refers to House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee, House Intergovernmental Affairs Subcommittee, House Budget and House State Affairs.

A proposed committee substitute and amendment to the proposed committee substitute passed the House Natural Resources and Disasters on February 12th. Representative Skidmore did a fantastic job asking questions regarding the need for the bill. The Town of Palm Beach did waive in support of the proposed committee bill. **We will continue to watch this bill as it could be amended to other bills.**

The bill had two committees of reference removed and now only has one committee left, the House State Affairs Committee.

The bill was not heard in the House State Affairs Committee on February 24th or February 26th. **The House State Affairs Committee does not have any committee meetings scheduled at this time.**

The bill language is also available to be amended onto other bills since it was heard in its first committee. We are watching closely as this language could be amended onto other boating bills.

The House Bill and Senate Bill are now comparable.

Boating Restricted Areas

[House Bill 1173 by Representative Tyler Sorois \(House Majority Leader\)](#)

This bill was filed by the House Majority Leader. The bill does not have a Senate companion currentThis bill was filed by the House Majority Leader. The bill does not have a Senate companion currently. The

bill is referred to three committees, House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee, House Intergovernmental Affairs Subcommittee and House State Affairs Committee. A delete everything amendment was heard and passed the House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee on February 12th. Again, Representative Skidmore did a good job of asking questions especially requesting clarity if FWC still needed to approve the ordinances as staff changed “shall not” to “may not” in the delete all. This is a drafting concern, and we have discussed it with staff. **We have also discussed it with the Senate and with FWC. FWC believes they will still have final say over approving the ordinances.**

As anticipated, this language was also amended in Representative Andrade’s bill (HB 1103) regarding code enforcement and derelict vessels. This bill passed the House State Affairs on February 24th unanimously. From this point forward, we will watch HB 1103 for this language and its Senate companion SB 1682. CS/CS/HB 1103 is on House Special Order March 3rd.

CS/CS/HB 1103 passed on the House floor and the Senate floor and is now enrolled. The bill will be sent to the Governor for approval with this language included.

This bill is a great example why we follow amendments and potential vehicles. This bill did not have a Senate sponsor but ultimately was amended on a similar bill and now will be sent to the Governor.

Please remember, last year bills without Senate companions did pass as they were sent to the Senate and referred to committee, heard and then passed on the Senate floor.

Again, we discussed our concerns with FWC regarding local interpretation which could be permissive with the drafting change.

Surface Waters/Coral Reefs

This bill filed by Senator Garcia and Representative Cross are no longer identical. Senate Bill 1422 has three committees of reference. The bill is referred to Senate Environment and Natural Resources, Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government and Rules. The bill passed by the Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee on February 3rd with a delete everything amendment. The bill is now related to Coral Reefs. We sent the bill and staff analysis for review. If you are interested in reviewing the information immediately, please click the link above for the Senate Bill. The bill does reference Palm Beach. The bill is not on the agenda this week in the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government on the 25th. **As of the writing of this report, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government does not have any more meetings scheduled.**

House Bill 1319 by Representative Cross only has two committees of reference. The bill is referred to House Natural Resources and Disaster and House State Affairs Committee. The bill did not make the agenda on the 18th. **As of the writing of this report, there are not any more meetings on the calendar.**

Nature Based Coastal Resiliency

House Bill 1035 is referred to two committees of reference. The bill is referred to the House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee and the House State Affairs Committee. The bill passed the House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee unanimously. The bill passed the House State Affairs Committee on February 17th as a committee substitute and is now ready to be heard on the House floor. **The House Bill is still on the House calendar. Please refer to the Senate companion below.**

Senate Bill 302 passed the Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee with an amendment. The bill is now a committee substitute. The bill has two more committees of reference. The next stop is the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government. The last stop for the bill is the Senate Fiscal Policy Committee.

Senate Bill 302 passed the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government this week. The bill passed with a delete all amendment 11-0. The bill is now a Committee Substitute for Committee Substitute. The bill passed the Senate Fiscal Policy Committee. CS/CS/SB 302 passed the Senate floor and is now in messages to the House.

Committee substitute for Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 302 has been placed on the House Special Order March 9th and has an amendment filed to restore the Ocklawaha River. If the amendment is adopted, it will bounce the bill back to the Senate for concurrence. The House has already passed the Ocklawaha River restoration bill off the House floor.

This is a bill we will pay close attention to this week.

The bills are similar and are positioned to pass if not amended with language considered unfriendly to one chamber. Remember, bills have to be identical to pass and pass both chambers.

Local Administration of Vessel Restrictions

The bills are identical. They allow local governments to pass ordinances granting code enforcement administrative authority over vessels at risk or becoming derelict, derelict vessels and long-term anchoring permits.

The Senate bill has three committees of reference. The bill passed the Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee on January 27th. The bill passed the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government, the second committee of reference on February 4th. The bill was amended with language reducing the number of moorings in statute for the Key West Bight City Dock. Senate Bill 1682 is now a committee substitute. **The bill passed the Senate Rules Committee on February 17th. The bill was then placed on the Senate Special Order and temporarily postponed and waiting for the House bill to come over in messages.**

House Bill also has three committees of reference. The bill is referred to House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee, House Intergovernmental Affairs Subcommittee and House State Affairs Committee. The bill passed by the House Natural Resources and Disasters Subcommittee is January 28th with an amendment and is now a committee substitute. The bill passed the House Intergovernmental Affairs Subcommittee with amendments including adding the language from the House Boating Restricted Area bill. The bill passed the final stop, the House State Affairs Committee on February 24th. No amendments were offered in the committee.

Committee Substitute for Committee Substitute for House Bill 1103 passed on the House Special Order calendar March 3rd 109-0. The House Bill was then sent to the Senate and was substituted for Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 1682. The Senate passed the bill 37-0.

CS/CS/HB 1103 is now enrolled and is one of 55 bills that a has passed this legislative session.

We have reached out to FWC and discussed these bills multiple times. FWC doe does not have concerns with the bill.

Motor Vehicle Registration

We will be watching House Bill 841 by Representative Fabricio and Senate Bill 982 by Senator Rodriguez relating to Motor Vehicle Registration. Meetings this week hinted that vessel registration potentially could be added to this proposed legislation. We will keep you posted.

The Senate Bill was not heard in its first committee of reference.

The House Bill passed the first committee of reference without any amendments this week. House Bill 841 passed the House State Affairs Committee on February 17th as a committee substitute. The bill passed on the House floor on February 25th 93-17. **The bill was sent in Messages to the Senate and then referred to the Senate Rules Committee. As of the writing of this report, the bill is still in the Senate Rules Committee.**

Also, please be aware, House Bil 1233 relating to Transportation sponsored by Representative Grif-fitts is now a comparable companion to these bills.

Property Taxes

Property tax has been a topic of discussion for the last year. This issue continues to take center stage.

The House of Representatives passed Committee Substitute for Committee Substitute for House Joint Resolution 203 by Representative Monique Miller relating to Elimination of Non-School Property for Homestead. The bill had numerous amendments and heated debate. Ultimately, the bill passed on the House floor 80-30 and was sent to the Senate and is now waiting to be heard in the Senate Appropriations Committee.

The House of Representatives still has several other potential resolutions moving through the process.

The Senate has yet to release their plan and the Governor has yet to release his plan during the eighth week.

The Senate and the House would need to pass the same property tax language for it to appear on the 2026 ballot in November.

We will keep you posted as this issue continues to move through the process and we still have one week left in the regular 2026 session.

This issue has the potential to be a special session topic in the spring or be an issue that causes the legislature to extend the regular legislative session past March 13th.

Also keep in mind the Governor cannot veto a joint resolution, joint resolutions go to the ballot for the voters to decide in November.

Budget Highlights

Please find below some of the budget highlights we have found in the House and Senate proposed budgets.

The House of Representatives and the Florida Senate have named their respective conferees.

We are still waiting for the House and Senate to agree on allocations. They are constitutionally required to pass a balanced budget; however, they have several months to iron out their differences.

A few budget reminders, Florida must pass a balanced budget and the conference report once agreed upon must rest for seventy-two hours before they can vote on final passage. The governor does have line-item veto powers relating to appropriation line items in the conference report. Florida is currently operating under the budget that passed last year and it ends June 30, 2026.

We will keep you updated on the progress of budget talks as they progress.
